

What's on the Ballot?

In 2023, Lino Lakes voters will be electing a mayor (2 year term) and 2 city councilmembers (4 year terms).

Preparing to Vote

If you have an address change, a name change, or have not voted in the last 4 years, you are required to complete a new registration application before voting. Voter registration applications are available at Lino Lakes City Hall or online at www.mnvotes.org. The deadline for pre-registration is Tuesday, October 12. After the deadline, voters may register at their polling place on Election Day with proper identification.

Where to Vote

Your polling location determined by your address. If you are unsure of your polling place, please check online at www.mnvotes.org or call Lino Lakes City Hall at 651-982-2400. On November 7th, polls will open at 7:00 AM and close promptly at 8:00 PM.

Absentee Voting

Absentee voting is available at Lino Lakes City Hall Monday through Friday from 8:00 AM - 4:30 PM, September 22, 2023 - November 3, 2023, and from 8:00 AM - 5:00 PM on Monday November, 6, 2023. Absentee Voting will also be available the Saturday before Election Day on November 4, 2023 from 10:00 AM - 3:00 PM.

During odd-year elections, online absentee ballot applications are not available and voters must complete the paper applications. Voters may access the paper application at the Anoka County Election website.

Election Judge Opportunities

Serving as an election judge is an important role and a great way to be involved in the election process. Visit the City website for more information and our online application. Note that students who are 16 or 17 years of age are eligible to serve as student election judges.

2024 Budget Process in Full Swing

The City Council held work sessions on the proposed 2024 budget and tax levy beginning in August and will adopt a preliminary tax levy on September 25, 2023. The preliminary tax levy represents revenues raised through property taxes to support general operations of the City. Final adoption of the tax levy will be considered by the Council following a public hearing on December 11, 2023.

Fall Swim Lessons

The Rookery offers swim lessons with highly trained swim instructors. The swim lesson program is geared towards teaching children and adults the swimming skills that build selfconfidence in and out of the water.

Classes are taught in small groups with 4-6 participants per class, and each lesson is 30 minutes in length. The pool in the Rookery is kept at an average of 87°F in the splash pool, and 82°F in the lap pool. The warm water temperatures promote happier swimming for young swimmers.



Fall Swim Registration is open now and session 2 starts the week of October 23.

Group Lessons: Six, 30-minute sessions. Our swim lesson program is divided by age starting at 6 months and swim ability. Members \$89 | Non-Members \$104

BACK-TO-SCHOOL SAFETY REMINDERS

The Lino Lakes Public Safety Department looks forward to another great school year and we understand the increased demands a new school year puts on families throughout our community. If you're new to Lino Lakes, welcome! At this busy time of year, we'd like to offer a few reminders related to school zone and school bus safety:



- Please remember to watch for pedestrians, especially at intersections and crosswalks. As drivers, we all need to be intentional in our efforts to see pedestrians and to stop for them. Remember that our round-about intersections incorporate crosswalks and they come up fast. Drive slowly and keep your eyes and your attention on what's ahead. Don't be distracted and keep your hands on the wheel.
- Please be aware of school zone speed limits and adjust your speed accordingly. Give yourself 5 extra minutes to get where you need to be.
- Please pay close attention to school buses. School bus drivers have a very tough job, give them the space they need and the grace they deserve. Early in the school year, bus drivers are adjusting to new kids, new routes, new stops, and new equipment. A greater following distance will give them the space they need to do their jobs well and keep our kids safe. When the amber lights on a school bus flash, prepare to stop. Remember that state law requires all vehicles, in both directions, to stop at least 20 feet away from a bus with red lights flashing and stop arm extended. Our agency investigates all stop arm violations with the help of school bus video technology. This is the only warning anyone will see for stop arm violations.



We wish you all the best as we get into this busy time of year, and hope to see you out in the community. Don't hesitate to call 911 to report emergencies or dangerous situations. Did you know... Approximately 98% of wildfires in Minnesota are caused by humans. More than 50 wildfires are started each year in Minnesota by campfires that are not completely extinguished, too large or unattended.

Some helpful tips to keep your campfire safe:

- Use a fire ring and build your fire at least five feet away from any combustible material.
- Keep a bucket of water nearby to put out the fire.
- Include a kid-free zone of 3-feet around the campfire.
- Never leave your campfire unattended.
- Check the burning restrictions for your area with the DNR before starting your campfire.

THE PINK PATCH PROJECT



FALL MAINTENANCE

Street Sweeping

Lino Lakes conducts a Street Sweeping Program twice a year that involves the removal of residual sand and debris accumulated on our city streets. Fall sweeping typically begins Mid-October until the snow starts to fall. Residents can help with the street sweeping process by moving their vehicles off city streets, placing trash cans behind the curb, and refraining from placing yard waste and other debris in the streets. The City Ordinance 405.03 states no person shall intentionally dispose of grass, leaves, dirt, or other landscape debris into a water resource buffer, street, road, alley, catch basin, culvert, curb, gutter, inlet, ditch, natural watercourse, wetland, flood control channel, canal, storm drain or any fabricated natural conveyance.




There are several ways residents can dispose of yard waste:

- Mulching in your yard
- Contact your local trash collector for yard waste disposal options
- Backyard composting
- Utilize the Rice Creek Compost Site located at 7701 Main Street, Lino Lakes (managed by Anoka County)

Hydrant Flushing

Each fall the City flushes hydrants to ensure that all hydrants are operating properly, and to clear sediment build-up. This causes turbulence of water in the water mains and may cause dark-colored water. Although the water is safe for human consumption, please check for discolored water before laundering clothes as it may stain certain fabrics. If clothes develop stains, do not dry, but rewash immediately to remove stains. In the case of discolored water, run the **cold** water for a few minutes.





Trail Reminders

A few friendly reminders while you are out enjoying the many trails Lino Lakes has to offer:

- Unauthorized motorized vehicles and recreation equipment are not allowed on the trails.
- When walking your pet please make sure to clean-up after them.
- If your property is located near a trail, please take a moment to check that your outdoor landscaping is pruned and not encroaching onto the trail. Our trail maintenance equipment requires an 8ft overhead clearance, and the city maintains the overgrowth on the trails as needed.
- If you have a concern about a trail, please report the problem to the Public Services Department.

Fall Water Yard Care Practices to Keep Our Water Clean

Stormwater can carry pollution and chemicals directly into ditches and storm drains which connect to lakes, streams, and wetlands. It is up to all of us to protect water.



Fertilizer Application

- Use Phosphorus-free fertilizers, or leave grass clippings as a natural and FREE fertilizer.
- When spreading fertilizer near paved surfaces, adjust your route to ensure fertilizer is not being applied to the pavement.
- Sweep or blow grass clippings or spilled fertilizer back onto lawns to prevent it from entering storm drains, ditches and then lakes and rivers.
- Keep fertilizer applications at least 15-20 feet away from the edges of wetlands, lakes, and streams.
- Store fertilizer in well-marked containers in closed areas to avoid spills.

POOL DRAINING GUIDE

Careful Pool Water Disposal Matters

Improper release of swimming pool water can harm local waterbodies, degrading water quality and wildlife while harming vegetation. Local waterbodies depend on responsible actions from everyone to remain healthy and functional for the community.

Pool Draining Steps:

- **1.** A week prior to draining the pool stop adding chlorine.
- 2. Test the water before draining: pH should be 6.5-7.8 and chlorine levels not detectable.
- 3. Pump pool water over an open vegetated area such as a lawn before letting it drain into a stormdrain. Look for natural drainage paths or alter the drainage path to keep water away from adjacent property and buildings.
- 4. Never drain pool water directly into a body of water such as a lake, stream, or wetland.
- **5.** Used pool filters can be thrown into the trash.

Pool draining tips:

- Careful use of pool chemicals can save money and help simplify the pool draining process.
- If pool drainage is a regular or semi-regular occurrence, it will be worth taking the time to make a permanent plan that includes hoses, pumps, and potentially landscaping strategies.
- Consider a backyard raingarden with an overflow feature as a strategy to capture pool water and rooftop runoff.
- Filter out any paint chips before draining.
- If using an acid product to clean the pool, make sure pH levels have adjusted to normal before draining. Always follow instructions on chemical labels for disposal and usage. Never mix two or more chemicals.
- Remember that stormdrains connect directly to waterbodies.

City Plowing Schedule

Snow plowing operations generally commence with accumulations of two inches of snow or more. Accumulations of less than two inches may also trigger operations if they are combined with icy or drifting conditions in which salt and/or sand will be applied following guidelines within the Minnesota Snow & Ice Management. To keep traffic moving, crews first plow streets that connect neighborhoods to State and County roads. Plowing operations stop if strong winds and drifting result in unsafe conditions; plowing resumes when conditions improve. For typical snowfalls, it generally takes 7 to 9 hours for our Public Works Department to clear the 200+ lane miles of City streets. For an up-to-date plowing schedule, follow us on Facebook.



Important Snow Removal Reminders

- Keep garbage and recycling behind the curb line and off roadways and sidewalks. Containers placed in the street, or at the end of the driveway may be damaged or knocked over.
- Keep kids' toys, sleds, and basketball hoops away from the street.
- Do not build snow forts along the street and in piles in cul-de-sacs. Plow drivers cannot see inside the forts and do not want to injure anyone.
- Keep fire hydrants clear and accessible during the winter. If you have a fire hydrant located near your house, please works with your neighbors to keep a cleared path from the street to the fire hydrants and a cleared 6-foot area around the fire hydrant. By doing this, firefighters will be able to easily locate and access the fire hydrant in case of an emergency.

Report issues, such as slippery intersections, potholes, snow plow damage, etc., by calling the Public Service Department at 651-982-2440.



Many people have to deal with the frustration of a frozen septic systems here in Minnesota where the temperature can drop below freezing. Fresh snow is an excellent insulator, while lack of snow and very cold air temperatures can be a real headache. With a little effort now, many potential freezing problems can be eliminated by taking the time to examine your system.

How can you prevent this from happening?

- In the fall, add loose, fluffy hay or straw mulch (8-12 inches) over the pipes, tank and soil treatment area.
- Keep all types of vehicles—including ATV's and snowmobiles—and high-traffic people activities off the system. This is a good rule to follow year-round.
- If the system is new, add a thick insulating layer over the bare soil to prevent a system from freezing.
- Use normal amounts of water. If freezing is a concern, increase water use (normal is 50 to 75 gallons per person per day). Schedule laundry to include one warm/hot load per day, use your dishwasher and take a hot bath daily. DO NOT leave water running all the time, as this will hydraulically overload the system. Also, **DO NOT** add antifreeze to the system.
- · Daily use septic tanks rarely freeze, even in cold weather. If you know you are going to be gone for more than a couple of days, have someone use quantities of water in the home regularly. If you are going to be gone for an extended period, pump the tank before leaving.
- · Keep an eye on your system. If any seeping or ponding occurs, contact an onsite professional to help determine the cause and remedy.

It is not necessary to do all of these, the more precautions you take the safer your system will be, but pick and choose based on your home.

PARK UPDATES

Pickleball Courts

There are now seven dedicated pickleball courts and three tennis/pickleball courts throughout our parks in Lino Lakes. The courts are located at City Hall Park, Tower Park, Arena Acres Park, and NorthPointe Park. We look forward to seeing everyone enjoying the pickleball courts!



Rice Lake Elementary Basketball Court

In 2004, the Centennial School District (CSD) and the City of Lino Lakes worked together to create a full-size basketball court at Rice Lake Elementary School. The CSD provided the land and the City paid for the construction. The court was replaced this past summer and is ready to be enjoyed for another 20 years!

Watermark Park

On February 13th, the City Council awarded Dimke Excavating the contract for the development of Watermark Park. Construction continues with final completion expected by October 31st, 2023. The playground equipment will be installed next spring 2024. The master plan is shown below.



DON'T FEED WILD ANIMALS

The City would like to remind residents that while it might well intentioned, feeding wild animals has significant consequences for both the wildlife and residents.

As animals are drawn away from their natural feeding and bedding areas by feeding them they move into areas where they can come into contact with traffic, resulting in accidents with motor vehicles. With additional feeding, animals can also congregate more closely and a higher concentration of animals increases the odds that deadly diseases will spread amongst them, rather than if they were feeding farther apart on their natural foods. These higher concentrations of larger plant-eating animals also can result in damage to privately owned crops and plants, slow forest regeneration, and change plant species composition.



Additionally, feeding alters behavior and makes animals less wild. They can become less fearful of humans, aggressive at feeding sites, and delay their winter migration, which can mean starvation if animals do not migrate to winter feeding areas and the feeding ceases. In turn, some animals eat themselves sick or to death in winter off of food provided for them from enterotoxaemia, a fatal disease often called "grain overload."

Though Lino Lakes does not currently prohibit the feeding of wild animals, it strongly urges residents to consider the negative effects and use discretion if they do choose to do so.

Water Conservation

Lino Lakes is a community so rich with natural water resources that it can be easy to forget that water is a finite resource. This year's drought has highlighted how crucial water is to the functioning of our community and everyday lives, and the importance of taking steps to decrease water usage. Conserving water starts at home where small changes can have large effects. Shaving just 1 minute off your daily shower can save more than 900 gallons a year. That is over 6,547,500 gallons of water that could be saved every year if one person in every household in Lino Lakes took this step.

Follow the tips below to start making an impact:

- Do not flush items that can easily be thrown out
- Load the dishwasher and laundry machine full
- Use cold water for laundry loads
- Keep a container of cold water in the fridge instead or running water for a cool drink
- · Check for and fix all leaks
- Buy products with the WaterSense label

Abandoned & Unsealed Wells

Wells are no longer used for a variety of reasons such as change in land use, contamination, corrected to a public water system, not enough water or needed repairs. Wells that are not being used for irrigation or consumption purposes are considered abandoned. An abandoned well can be a potential threat to health, safety and the environment by contaminating the groundwater.



Well Inspections

It is important to get your well inspected. Common defects observed during inspections are a loose or damaged well cap, cracks in the casing, settlement or soil around the casing, and an open space around the casing.

Prevent Water Runoff

Soil that slopes away from the well prevents surface water runoff to enter it.



Make Sure Covers Are Secure

Once secure, hire a licensed contractor to seal all unused. unsealed wells. Minnesota law (statues 1031.301) requires the sealing of all abandoned wells.



Prevent contamination by not using household chemicals or hazardous materials within 100 feet of the well, using pesticides and fertilizers sparingly and picking up pet waste off your property to name a few.



Health & Environment

An unused well can act like a drain, allowing surface water runoff, contaminated water, or improperly disposed waste a direct pathway into drinking water sources. When this occurs, the quality of everyone's

water is threatened - city water wells, neighbor's wells, even your current well. Therefore, it is recommended that homeowners test their water annually.

Guidelines for Recycling Plastics

No Bulky Plastic Items

Items like plastic toys, chairs, or baskets, should not be placed in curbside recycling. They often are made of multiple types of materials making them difficult to recycle.



Only #1,2,5 Plastic Can Be Recycled



Items marked with a #1, #2, or #5 can be repurposed into something else. Plastic items that can be recycled are

food and beverage bottles, milk and juice jugs, laundry containers, shampoo and soap bottles, and clear cups and produce containers. Make sure these are cleaned out as best you can and keep the caps on so they don't get lost in recycling facilities.

Please DO NOT recycle:

- Black plastic such as takeout containers: The technology at recycling facilities cannot detect this material.
- Plastic straws and utensils: Small items get lost in recycling facilities. Try to use reusable utensils instead.
- Plastic bags such asgrocery bags: although these are sometimes labeled as #2, these should not be put in curbside recycling. These can get tangled in the machinery used to sort items and need to be manually cut off. Many stores have plastic bag drop off programs you can bring them to instead.

PERMITS

A reminder to residents that the following permits are required prior to work commencing:

Building Permit

Accessory structure over 200 sq ft, additions, basement finish, chimney, deck, demolition, fence 7+ ft high, fire suppression/fire alarm, manufactured home, move in building, new construction, new foundations, porch, remodel, replacement door and/or window, retaining wall 48 inches or greater in height, including buried portion, roofing, siding, solar panels, swimming pool.

Zoning Permit

Accessory structures 200 sq ft or less, driveways, fences 6 ft or less in height, grading, irrigation (lawn sprinkler system), retaining walls 48 inches or less (including buried portion).

Plumbing Permit

Backflow prevention, drain piping, drain tile systems, septic systems, sewer and/or water hookup, waste or vent piping, water heater, water supply lines.

Mechanical Permit

Air conditioner, fireplace (gas or wood), furnace or boiler, garage furnace/heater, gas line, in-floor heating, and mechanical alterations.

Sign Permit

Sign permits are required for commercial and business properties in the city. Please contact the City Planner at 651-982-2426 regarding signage in residential areas.

Electrical Permit

Electrical permits are required for all electrical work. Electrical permits are issued by the State of Minnesota. Please contact www.dli.mn.gov/business/getlicenses-and-permits/permits or call Lino Lakes Building Department for information.

Permit applications are available on the City website at www.LinoLakes.us or at City Hall. The Building Department is open from 8:00 A.M. to 4:30 P.M, Monday through Friday.

Emerald Ash Borer

Emerald Ash Borer (EAB) is a beetle that kills ash trees. Lino Lakes, along with the rest of the Metro, is in an area considered heavily infested by this beetle. Ultimately, ash trees in Lino Lakes will be killed, treated with insecticide, or removed.

The time to decide if you will treat or eventually remove your tree is now. October 1st through April 30th is the best time to remove ash trees because the beetles and larvae are dormant.

The City has partnered with Rainbow Treecare to offer discount ash injections for private trees that homeowners would like to preserve. More information can be found by following the link: www.rainbowtreecare.com/cities/lino-lakes

*Please note that trees in the right-of-way and other public space are City-managed and will ultimately be removed and replaced.

What You Need to Know About EAB

It is important to be able to recognize the signs of an EAB-infested tree. Common symptoms include heavy woodpecker activity on the tree, dying branches in the upper canopy, sprouts around the tree base, vertical cracks in the bark, S-shaped tunnels under the bark, and 1/8-inch D-shaped exit holes in the bark.

Please DO NOT move firewood! Anoka County is in the quarantine zone. Moving ash material and all hardwood firewood from the guarantine zone is prohibited. Utilizing the wood near the site where the tree grew is a good option for disposal.
